Souper Bowl of Caring February 11th

The Souper Bowl of Caring takes place on the second Sunday in February. Wait! Isn't that the same Sunday as the Super Bowl? Yes! We are encouraged to take our level of passion for football and match it with our passion for giving to those in St George who are hungry. Bring your food donations along with you to church! Bring your money donations and place them in the donation box in the Narthex. Each donation is equal to a touchdown for those who are in need right here in our hometown.

The Presbytery's Matthew 25 Initiative group is again holding a competition between Utah Presbyterian congregations to see who can gather the most food and raise the most money. The competition is on a per capita basis, meaning that the total amount collected is divided by the number of members of the church. We are a large church so, if we want to win, we will need to collect A LOT of food and cash.

The food and cash collected will go to Solomon's Porch. Let's stop by our favorite grocery stores, buy many food items (the more the better) and bring them to church on Sundays between now and February 11th to fill the Narthex and score touchdowns for those who are hungry!

Lent Begins This Month

The season of Lent and our celebration of Easter are always busy times at Good Shepherd and 2023 will be no exception.

With Easter a lot earlier this year, March 31st, Lent will begin on Valentines Day.

We will celebrate the Good Shepherd version of Mardi Gras on Shrove Tuesday, February 13th, with our annual Shrove Tuesday pancake dinner at 5:30 pm in Conklin Hall. Dinner will be followed by a short "Retiring the Alleluia" service in Conklin Hall. Rev. Ralph needs volunteers to help cook for this event and onsite training will be available! A sign-up sheet will be available soon on the sign-up table in Conklin Hall.

Our observation of Lent formally begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14th. At Noon we will hold a joint soup and sandwich lunch in Conklin Hall with our brothers and sisters from Shepherd of the Hills United Methodist Church. Lunch will be followed by our annual Ash Wednesday Service in the Sanctuary. For those who can't attend during the day, Rev. Ralph will be in the Sanctuary again from 6:30 pm to 7:15 pm on Ash Wednesday for the Imposition of the Ashes.

Rev. Ralph's Lenten Bible study and potluck will kick off on February 19th at 5:30 pm in the CE Building. The weekly study, focusing on a Spiritual Journey through Holy Week, will continue until March 18th.

Lent will continue through March, and we'll have more about our Holy Week activities next month.

We hope everyone will participate in as many activities as possible during this most important season of the church year.



This past year the common phrase to describe the times we have lived through and are living in is the "New Normal". I'm not sure any of us fully likes the "New Normal", but also in common use is the phrase, "It is what it is."

However, it is important to not be complacent in these challenging times. We look ahead and see what God is preparing for us in our common future. For I do believe God is doing something new, as we hear in the words of the prophet Isaiah, and challenging us to faithfully see and follow into the future that our Lord is calling us into.

I was part of a team from BURM to visit Moldova in the fall. I received strong support from the congregation to make this mission trip for which I am very grateful. My experiences on this trip have touched me deeply.

We continue our active participation and support of the Saint George Area Interfaith Council, for which this year we were the second largest contributor to the annual CROP Walk. However, from our congregation we saw a substantial increase in both participation and contributions.

The rebuilding continues even in the face of some challenges. We know whose guiding hand continues to shepherd us throughout these days and times. Our Lord and Savior continues to call us into a new and bright future that we have only begun to enter. The New Day, I believe, is dawning! "Will you not be aware of it?"

In the meantime, I want to express my great appreciation for our Session, Deacons, Stephen Ministers and staff for their care, leadership, and counsel through these interesting and challenging days.

And I want to express my great appreciation to our congregation who have remained positive, supportive, generous, faithful and hopeful with a loving Christian spirit throughout these days.

The Lord is near, and he has led us through these days and now into the future. And I continue to give thanks to Him for you all.

Buildings & Grounds

Good news! Desert Fall Landscaping has been awarded the contract for landscaping of the western undeveloped part of the church property to support installation of a Solar Electric System (SES). The original contract was expanded to include the entire back area to improve the security of the back area for the solar panels and improve the overall appearance of the property. The anticipated overall cost of the landscaping phase will be \$34,500.

Work is planned to start February 12th with expected completion March 1st.

A chain link fence and gate contract will be advertised for bid around the SES portion later.

Guy Schultzman is currently accepting bids for the SES by interested contractors at this time with the hope of awarding the contract for the system in the spring.

Mission/Outreach

As you read on the front page, the Souper Bowl of Caring is coming up on February 11th. The Souper Bowl of Caring began in 1990 with a simple prayer said by Reverend Brad Smith at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, South Carolina: Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat. Twenty-two churches raised \$5,700 in the first year. Now the Souper Bowl of Caring is an ongoing organization in which hundreds of churches participate – donating to their local charities for those who are hungry. Since its inception the Souper Bowl of Caring has raised more than \$100,000,000 in cash and food.

We will be competing with the other churches in the Presbytery to see who can bring in the highest average amount of food or cash per member. Let's do what we usually do with the CROP Walk and lead all the others!

You may have noticed that this year's Change 4 Change donation will go to Neighborhood Connection. Neighborhood Connection is a non-profit organization dedicated to fight childhood hunger. They provide supplemental weekend food, called Pantry Packs for school children who qualify for school breakfast & lunch programs. Pantry Packs are gallon sized Ziploc bags filled with enough child friendly, shelf-stable food for 2 breakfasts, 2 lunches, and several snacks. In Washington County there are approximately 35,000 students enrolled in grades K-12. Of these students, over 17,000 qualify for free & reduced lunch. Neighborhood Connection serves Pantry Packs to 800 students each week who are at risk of going without food on the weekends. These students are identified by teachers and administrators as children "in need of food assistance." Distribution is done in such a way as to preserve the dignity of the children and their families. So, gather up your spare change and put it in the box in the Narthex!

For those who are interested, all of our Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes were shipped to Mexico. Donna Beasley reports that, even though it's February, it's never too early to start gathering items to go in shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child. We have a goal of filling 100 shoeboxes in November and need your help. The featured items for February are toothbrushes and bar soap. The Knotty Knitters are busy making baby doll cradles and pillowcase dresses. We hope you will help us with our biggest Mission project of the year.

- Approved by E-vote on 12-11-2023 a request from Merritt and Beverly Perkins for removal from membership.

- Approved to award a contract for landscaping of the far western side of the Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church property to Desert Falls Landscaping to support the installation of a Solar Electric System in the northwest corner of the property at a cost not to exceed \$34,500.
- Approved to schedule the 2024 Elder/Deacon Training on February 24, 2024, 9:00 am to 12:00 Noon in Conklin Hall and the CE Building.
- Approved to purchase a new Christ Candle (oil candle) and holder for the Advent Wreath at a cost not to exceed \$500 to be paid from the Memorial Fund.
- Approved to purchase a AODSK Weighted 88-key Digital Piano and CAHAYA Adjustable Keyboard Stand at a cost not to exceed \$350 to be paid from the Memorial Fund.
- Approved as per the approved 2024 General Fund Budget, Churchwide Mission Donations as follows:
 - \$2,000 to Ellen Smith, Presbyterian Mission Co-worker for Eastern Europe
 - \$500 to the YMCA of Moldova for programs to assist Ukrainian refugees
 - \$500 to Zdorovil Gorod's programs to assist Ukrainian refugees
 - \$1,500 to Presbytery for general Churchwide Mission
- Approved the appointment of Mary Laubscher as Treasurer for 2024.
- Approved the appointment of Ruth Ann Horvath as Session Clerk for 2024.
- Approved the appointment of Anne Patten as Commissioner to the Presbytery for 2024.
- Approved the appointment of Elder Leslie Lintz to serve as Elder-Chairperson of the 2024 Nominating Committee.
- Approved a Health Reimbursement Arrangement Plan Resolution covering the 2024 year and establishing the annual HRA covered expenses for Rev. Clingan be set at a total of \$4,000 for 2024.
- Approved to set the second Sunday of each month at 12:00 Noon in the CE Building as the Stated Session Meetings for 2024 and January 2025, except for the month of February 2024, when the meeting will be held on Saturday, February 10, 2024, at 9:30 am at Ovation Senior Living in Washington, Utah.

- Approved to set the first Sunday of each month as the dates of Communion for 2024 and on the first Sunday in January 2025. Approved to serve Communion at every Sunday Prayer Service, Maundy Thursday Service (March 28, 2024) and to members who are shut ins. - Approved to appoint a commission consisting of Rev. Ralph Clingan and Ruth Ann Horvath to prepare 2023 PCUSA Annual Statistical Report.
- Held a meeting of the Corporation and elected 2024 Corporate Officers: Chris Schleter, President; Leslie Lintz, Vice-President, Ruth Ann Horvath, Secretary; Mary Laubscher, Treasurer.
