Easter Is Just Around the Corner

It's been a busy Lenten season in 2023 and Easter will be here very soon.

We anticipated the beginning of Lent with the Shrove Tuesday Dinner. As we move closer to the Resurrection of our Lord on April 9th, Easter Sunday, we look forward to several upcoming events.

On April 2nd, Palm Sunday, Rev. Ralph and his team of volunteers will serve us a hearty breakfast beginning at 8:30 am in Conklin Hall. This event is always well attended, and we appreciate the efforts of all who provide food for us. Our service on Palm Sunday will be filled with music by our choirs.

Rev. Ralph will wrap up his Lenten Bible Study series on Monday, April 3rd at 5:30 pm in the CE Building. The topic this year has been the Psalms.

On Maundy Thursday, April 6th, we will hold an Agape Dinner beginning at 6:00 pm in Conklin Hall. The lighting of oil lamps adds to the significance of this service.

The following day, Good Friday, will kick off with the annual Procession of the Cross. We will gather at 10:30 am at Diagonal Park and finish around Noon at the St. George Catholic Church. Good Friday will close with an Ecumenical Service at 7:00 pm at New Promise Lutheran Church.

We will not have an early service or adult education on Easter Sunday, April 9th, so we can all prepare ourselves to celebrate our Risen Lord. After the service, we hope you will join us for Easter Brunch in Conklin Hall.

We look forward to seeing you at as many of these events as can attend.

Memorial Garden Closed During April

For several months, a committee led by Guy Schultzman has been working on a plan for the renovation of our Memorial Garden. The initial phase, completed last fall, involved removing some old, diseased, trees, replacing parts of the border hedges and doing some work on the gazebo which actually is the steeple from the original St. George Presbyterian church.

Phase 2 will involve adding two more rose gardens, removing approximately 2750 square feet of sod, replacing it with landscaping stone and desert plants, and completely renovating the current irrigation system for the entire garden.

The total cost of the project is about \$24,000 and the good news is that by removing the sod we qualify for a rebate from the Washington County Water Conservancy District's Water Efficient Landscape Program of about \$5,500.

The contracts for phase 2 have been signed and work will begin Easter Monday, April 10th. From then until approximately April 23rd, the Memorial Garden will be closed for construction.

While we will be inconvenienced for a couple of weeks, the end results will be a fresh new space that will serve our congregation's needs for decades to come.



And then their eyes were opened and they recognized Him; and He vanished from their sight. They said to one another, "Were our hearts not burning within us when He was speaking to us on the road, while He was explaining the Scriptures to us?" And they got up that very hour and returned to Jerusalem, and found the eleven gathered together and those who were with them, saying, "The Lord has really risen and has appeared to Simon!" They began to relate their experiences on the road, and how He was recognized by them at the breaking of the bread. Now while they were telling these things, Jesus Himself suddenly stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be to you." Luke 24:31-35 NASB



On Sunday morning, April 9th, our worship service will begin with the words, "He is Risen, He is Risen Indeed!". With this declaration our service and celebration begins. We declare that with the dawn and an empty tomb our world and lives have forever changed. Death, the spiritual separation from God, has been dealt a fatal blow. Our life, spiritual union with God through Christ has begun. Then, of course, we have a ham brunch in Conklin Hall. ©

It is indeed a day for celebration that is intended to last a lifetime. However, eventually, we shall leave Conklin Hall, our church grounds, and venture forth into a world that looks very much like the one we traversed earlier in the day. A world with the same fears, doubts, problems and complexities.

We might be tempted to believe that there is an apparent contradiction; and in so doing miss the point: that it is not the world around us as much as the life within us that has had a change of view. A change of heart, a spark kindled to flame.

The Gospel of Luke tells us of a couple of disciples who fled Jerusalem on that first Easter morning and later in the day encountered on the road a stranger, who later opened their hearts and lives. So much so in the darkness of night they ran to share the news, the Good News. And as they shared that wonderous news, there Jesus was, in their midst.

There is perhaps a lesson to be learned in their story. That we are called to not only hear the Easter Sunday declaration of resurrection, but as well to claim the story as now becoming our own, and with our lives, declare it to our world. Wherever that world may be or lead us.

Rev. Ralph's recent sermon based on the scripture of Jesus giving sight to the blind man, tugged at my heart-strings. You see, one of my greatest fears is that of losing my sight. I have always been afraid of the dark. There are nightlights all over our house. I have a little butterfly lamp that is on all night in my bedroom. And, of course, I am a visual learner.

So, when I lost the use of my left eye due to an inoperable cancerous tumor behind that eye, my fear was palpable. My radiologist said that it surrounded the optic nerve, and that I would most

likely lose vision in that eye if not the eyeball as well.

Today my tumor is 25% of its initial size – and may still be shrinking. I am able to open that eyelid slightly, and I still have vision in my left eye. I now have hope that both issues may be improved surgically.

None of this is due to a miracle of modern medicine.

I believe that all of this improvement is due to the prayers that you prayed for me. Our Lord was listening! God bless you all!
